Frustration, suggestions shared at BU presidential search forums

Two recent open forums hosted by the Presidential Search Committee served as outlets for gathering information about desired attributes in Bradley's next university president. Discussions at the events went beyond looking forward, however, as they centered primarily on frustrations of faculty, staff, community members and students.

On March 26, the committee hosted a forum in Westlake Hall. With just a few more than 10 students in attendance, the majority of comments were made by faculty and some staff members.

Although discussion at the forums provided feedback about issues at Bradley that will aid in the search process, most comments did not directly relate to the

four questions about presidential qualities listed as a guide for the forums

For current issues, forum participants said the university's transition state, including vacancies for many high level positions, has created an uncertain environment.

"I think you perhaps underestimate the concern or the vacuum of leadership that exists when we are absent a provost or absent a president, and we're in a very difficult budget situation," associate accounting professor Stephen Kerr said. "There is a tremendous amount of anxiety and rightly so; there isn't leadership in place."

A candidate with strong fiscal responsibility and a focus on academics was a common request from forum attendants.

"We need a president who knows that they need to give the provost the academic budget," interactive media professor Ed Lamoureux said. "We can't run the academic program with the Provost running up to Swords Hall asking for money; it slows everything down. Part of the slide away from academics is that the person with that authority doesn't have that authority."

Students echoed this sentiment. "Instead of bleeding \$8 million into athletics, maybe we should make our priority academics; that's the primary goal of the institution, and that's what we should strive for," junior political science major William Bessler said.

Bradley legacy Mackenzie Payne said she still believes in Bradley as a worthwhile university, but she has significant financial concerns as a student.

"The rate of tuition goes up higher than the rate of inflation every year," the sophomore English major said. "But here at Bradley, the scholarships we are offered as we came in as freshmen don't change at all, which is kind of like we are being punished for various budgetary problems that Bradley might have...I come from Wisconsin, where I can get a public education for \$12,000 a year, but I'm here at Bradley because I think it's better. Raising tuition to make up for not having enough students is just like punishing the students you have here."

Last week's forum was followed by another on Monday, which was held in the Hayden-Clark Alumni Center Ballroom and welcomed community members to share their thoughts.

"As a parent who has done this college search for six children in the past, I know that the neighborhood is very important, and I know that you tend to live in an isolated situation where you feel you just go from building to build-

Data breach could affect nearly 5,000

The evening of March 30 took the university by surprise, as Bradley employees were notified of a data breach.

University spokeswoman Renee Charles said approximately 4,700 current and former employees' personally identifiable information may have been accessible to unauthorized users. She also said that students would not be affected by this breach unless they are dependents of university employees.

"We immediately identified malware on two computers [on March 26] that were removed from the system and deactivated," she said. "We have our internal computing services, external computing service experts, the FBI and the [Internal Revenue Service] all working together on this."

Charles said one or two employees had initially reported a suspicious IRS notification that informed the individuals their tax returns would not go through when filed.

As more employees were found to be receiving the same notification, Charles said the university immediately opened an internal investigation.

"The malware may have been able to capture this personally identifiable information such as names, dates of birth and social security numbers," she said.

Charles said although the university is unaware exactly how the malware was transferred onto the computers at this time, the goal of the investigation is to determine where it came from.

Retired Associate Provost of Information Resources and Technology (IRT) Chuck Ruch said viruses such as malware can be transferred onto devices in ways as simple as clicking a link

in an email.

"If someone sends you something that appears to be a PDF file, but they hid malware in it, when you click on them, then they work in the background and install [while you're looking at the PDF]," he said.

Ruch also said although nothing like this happened in the 10 years he worked in IRT, the only real way to remove any sort of risk is to not use the Internet at all.

There is no silver bullet to keep things like this from happening," Ruch said. "People are always subject to manipulation by people with nefarious intent."

Charles said the university has always taken precaution with Internet safety and has been hiring security auditors to come and audit the university's system annually for the last five to six years.

Ruch said this is an important part of internet safety.

"Security auditors come with

the goal to try and break into our machines," Ruch said. "They find vulnerabilities, and we fix them to prevent things from happening."

Charles said the university is sorry for this breach of information and will do everything possible to solve the issue.

"We so sincerely apologize for this happening because we take it very seriously," she said. "[In the annual audits], we receive high rankings every year. We just had one six months ago. We're very sorry, and we'll do everything we can to help people protect themselves."

There are three primary venues Charles said employees can utilize during this time.

The first is the Bradley website created to address this problem, which provides frequently asked questions, a step-by-step process of what do if you think you've been affected, resource links and credit reporting help pages.

The second piece of the plan is offering a one-year subscription, at no charge, to LifeLock services for all Bradley employees. Charles said in order to accept this offer,

employees must go to the Bradley webpage and use the direct link and code.

Finally, the university has created a call center that is on-campus and available each day to help those who may have been affected.

"We may never know why this happened, but we are looking and trying to get as many answers as we can," Charles said. "The best way to help do that is to call the resource center. They are local people answering questions on campus right now, and it helps us gather information [for the investigation] too."

Charles said what the university does next will depend upon what the investigation turns up.

Ruch said he believes in the staff working to find a solution.

"I have the utmost confidence in my IRT staff that I left behind," he said. "The security guys are second to none."

Steiner school officially dedicated

In front of a crowd of about 100 students, faculty, staff and Peoria Mayor Jim Ardis, the Charley Steiner School of Sports Communication was officially dedicated in a ceremony Tuesday afternoon with the revealing of the school's watermark printed on the wall of the Caterpillar Global Communications Center.

Steiner, a 1971 Bradley graduate, attended the ceremony held on the third floor landing of the GCC. In his speech, Steiner talked about the phone call he received from Hall of Fame broadcaster Vin Scully welcoming him to the Dodgers, the team Steiner rooted for growing up.

"Everyone should have a phone call like that just once in their life,"

Steiner said. "Today, at this ceremony, on a hilltop, this Hilltop, I'm having a second once-in-a-lifetime moment, two more than I could ever have expected, much less dreamed of, for which I thank you, and I'm eternally grateful."

The ceremony opened with Jeffrey Huberman, dean of the Slane College of Communications and Fine Arts, giving some background on how the sports communication program at Bradley began. Huberman specifically mentioned University President Joanne Glasser as someone crucial to the program's implementation.

"Developing great academic programs takes courage; it's a risk," Huberman said. "The reason that we're here today to honor this great academic program with one of our greatest graduates is because we had a great academic leader as our partner from the very beginning."

After Glasser provided some background on Steiner's career and achievements, which include

four Emmy awards and an introduction to the National Radio Hall of Fame in 2013, Department of Communication Chairperson Paul Gullifor described exactly what Steiner's donation would allow Bradley to accomplish.

"Your generosity is going to transform sports communication, the Department of Communication and Bradley University into true national distinction," Gullifor said. "What we can do as a result of this is to take it to the next level. This opens the opportunity and enables new partnerships, internships, symposiums, lectureships, guest lectures and television programs...all those things are possible. I can now say that the sky is officially the limit for sports communication."

To close the ceremony, Huberman referred to a portion of Steiner's speech from earlier in the day, referencing a piece of advice Steiner shared with The Scout in January.

"Charley, you said earlier you are the messenger, not the message," Huberman said. "Well, not today."

SBO debate provides insight

Student Body Officer candidates shared their platforms at a debate Wednesday in Marty Theater in preparation for the upcoming election in front of a crowd of about 40 students.

The Student Senate election subcommittee members asked questions of candidates running for President of the Student Body, Speaker of the Assembly, Secretary of the Finances and Secretary of the Assembly.

Junior mechanical engineering major Ashley Borja and freshman criminal justice major Allie Hoffman started the debate as contenders for Secretary of the Assembly.

Borja said her biggest goal is to improve communication within Student Senate as well as with the student body.

"As a member outside of [Student] Senate, I really had no idea what was going on within [Student] Senate," Borja said, listing this as an issue she hopes to address if elected.

Hoffman said she believes one of the jobs of the secretary is to promote student participation with Senate and on campus.

"In this coming year, changes that I would like to see is more student involvement," Hoffman

Speaker of the Assembly candidates sophomore political science and public relations double major Charles Cohen, sophomore political science major Olga Krapivner and junior psychology and Spanish double major Sojourner White, with Brianna Williams as her proxy due to her semester abroad, responded to questions such as how to fill Senate seats.

Cohen said though he thinks it is extremely important to fill the seats, he believes it is more about finding senators who represent the student body.

"Anybody can sit in a meeting, [so] it's about finding quality individuals that have something to say and who represent the students of Bradley," Cohen said.

Krapivner said she believes communication is key in filling

is what Senate does," Krapivner said. "It's a great organization, [and] it involves so much more than what people think."

White's proxy said White thinks people come to an organization to get involved, but they stay because of the people they meet. So, White suggests having mixers and events outside of the general assembly meetings to make senators seem more approachable.

Sophomore construction major Brian Ivancich and senior political science and accounting double major Hunter Vaughn discussed potential terms as Secretary of the Finances.

When distributing funding, Ivancich said he will look at past funds and take things on a caseby-case basis, while Vaughn said he thinks the process is a collaborative effort between officers, in cooperation with the history of funding.

Presidential date responses from Jason Blumenthal, a junior political science and economics double major, and Sarah Handler, a junior industrial engineering major, concluded the debate.

As an incumbent candidate, Blumenthal said if reelected, he expects to see a decision on setting a tuition freeze, the establishment of a three-year plan to improve campus Internet services and the building of relationships with new administra-

"Those are three things I would like to accomplish, but if they need to be changed to meet student needs, that's what we'll do," Blumenthal said.

Handler said the changes she would like to see, if elected, include strengthening campus sustainability as well as increasing diversity within student organizations. She also said she would like to see more people passionate about Student Senate.

"The main thing I would love to see is for this campus to be more inclusive," Handler said. "I would love to see events having diverse membership as well as attendance."

Chase hired as executive director of diversity and inclusion

The Division of Student Affairs announced Tuesday morning that Interim Director of Multicultural Student Services Norris Chase would be promoted to be the first executive director of Diversity and Inclusion.

Chase said the news both humbled and excited him. "It's a blessing," he said. "I'm still surprised that I get paid to do what I do...I'm just so genuinely excited." Student Senate Vice President of Diversity Affairs Jay

Mehta said he was "overjoyed" with the hiring of Chase. "Through his previous position, he propelled Bradley in the direction of not only accepting each other's cultures, but also educating the community on the importance of understanding different cultures to promote the inclusion of one another," Mehta said. "No matter what position, Norris will keep planning different events and keep open communication lines between the community and himself to further students' understanding of diversity."

With the announcement of Chase's appointment also comes the change in name from Multicultural Student Services to the Office of Diversity and

"The [current] name has a lot of stigma that comes with it, and in addition, we did not capitalize as well as we could have on it," Chase said. "This rebranding gives us a different approach to achieving our goals... Diversity and inclusion is so wide and is an umbrella that gives us new connection possibilities with students. It's a new brand, a new approach, a new energy [and] a new beginning."

Chase said one of his primary goals is to improve the student experience through enhanced storytelling. "We have to do a better job at documenting what

we do," he said. "It's all about the student experience, capitalizing on it and allowing [students] to tell their

A week named for Bradley's first African-American professor Romeo B. Garrett was one example Chase had to illustrate goals for future projects.

"Our office hosts a Garrett Week [every year] in the third week of April." he said. "[The week has] a list of activities and programs that celebrate [Garrett's] legacy and ideals. He had such an appreciation for diversity, culture and inclusiveness, especially in a time where he could have gotten hurt for doing that stuff."

Chase said this week often goes unnoticed in the campus community, and as executive director, he plans to empower students to help him promote greater inclusivity and appreciation for culture on campus through activities such as Garrett Week.

He also said he is looking forward to getting to work on motivating others alongside himself to focus on the office's number one priority: the student experience.

Vice President of Student Affairs Nathan Thomas said he is excited about the future with Chase at the helm.

"I look forward to working with Norris in this new capacity and to begin the implementation of his many ideas in creating a renewed focus to this important area," Thomas said.

Chase said the students are the reason he does what he does, and he is honored to be able to serve them and the campus alike.

"The supportive community of Bradley is something that I've benefited from and also grown from," he said. "My professional experience has been shaped by Bradley, and so coming from where I come from, being in a place where people appreciate you but also challenge you is something that I can't tell you how much I appreciate."

ing and classroom to classroom, but that isn't the truth," community member and Moss-Bradley Residential Association member Marjorie Klise said. "That isn't what parents are looking for when they come to town. They want to know how their children are going to walk from their off-campus housing to their classrooms. They want to know where they're going to go jogging at night. They want to know where they're going to walk for their entertainment, and I think when a school administration doesn't have a good town relationship, I think it's not to your

Despite being a community forum, Monday's discussion was still dominated primarily by internal concerns. The importance of being aligned with the culture, mission and values of Bradley were main topics stressed at the forum.

"If a change agent were to come, I would like to be very clear that that change agent knows who we are because there are very few places like us," psychology professor Tim Koeltzow said. "As a consequence, we have to do things based on an authentic knowledge of who we are, and sometimes that means doing things very differently than what everybody else is doing."

Beyond describing attributes of an ideal presidential candidate, forum participants highlighted some of the challenges facing the next university president.

"I see morale as the lowest it's ever been since I've been here," associate professor of marketing Matt O'Brien said.

Although students primarily expressed satisfaction with their Bradley experiences, they did

identify with some of the frustrations of university employees.

"When we don't have the faculty returning [and] when the faculty aren't being taken care of, the students aren't being taken care of," Charlie Cohen, a sophomore political science and public relations double major, said. "Without the students and without the faculty, there isn't a Bradley."

The university's fiscal health and budgeting decisions were highlighted, not just by employees, but by students as well.

"We keep funding things that have proven unsuccessful, and our successful programs are not [getting] funding," freshman health science major Sarah Bujold said, describing the speech team and engineering department as examples of "amazing programs" that lack appropriate funds. "We're not putting money into this thing that people will look at Bradley for, and I want to see a president who will do that."

When wrapping up discussions, Presidential Search Committee Chair Calvin Butler said he had two main takeaways from the forums: they were overdue, and people are passionate about Bradley.

"To be honest, I didn't hear anything that I hadn't heard before, but it reinforced what we thought as a search committee," Butler said. "It gave us a sense we are heading in the right direction, and that's the great part about it. It also maybe reinforces the need that we look at a way as a board to connect more often, because I don't want gaps in what we're trying to do."

University president search continues

Presidential Search Committee Chair Calvin Butler recently updated the campus community on where the Board of Trustees is at in the presidential search process.

"We would love to have a new president hired by the start of the academic year, so we'd put that in an August-September time frame," Butler said. "But we are not going to let that force us into a decision of someone who we think may not be the right fit because it's convenient. We are going to take our time. Our belief is that we won't take anything off the table because we want to do it right."

The committee's next meeting will be at the end of April, by which time Butler said he hopes to have a "nice supply of applicants."

As for the possibility of appointing an interim, which was an idea briefly discussed during last week's forum, Butler echoed Chairman of the Board of Trustees Doug Stewart's statement from earlier this semester saying it would serve as a backup plan.

"The interim comes along if we do not have what we believe is the right fit and the right person for the university, so that's how we

are approaching that right now," Butler said. "Ideally, we'd love to have someone ready to go [in August], but again, it's all about making the right decision."

The search will most likely bring external candidates to campus, as Butler said no internal candidates have expressed interest thus far.

Throughout the process, Butler stressed he will work to keep faculty, staff, students and Peoria residents updated with what the committee is doing.

"I know that there is a community email system, and we are working with the university to make sure we set up a process where we are communicating to the staff as well as faculty," Butler said. "I will communicate the next steps after that April [meeting] because I never want you, or the students, or the administration, or faculty or staff to have to guess where we are."

With regard to Bradley's next president, Butler said he is optimistic.

"I am as committed as anyone to the student environment and experience here at Bradley University," he said. "I can't ensure you a lot, but I can ensure you that the next president will have that same commitment."

NBC asks for more BU Olympic interns

For the third time in a row, NBC Sports will welcome Bradley interns to its media team covering the Olympics.

"[This] speaks to the high quality of our students and the excellent preparation provided by our great faculty," Chairperson of the Department of Communication Paul Gullifor said. "It also speaks to the great performance of the students who worked at the 2012 summer games and 2014 winter games."

The Summer 2016 Olympics will be held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, which also recently played host to the 2014 FIFA World Cup.

As with any Olympics, safety of visitors is an issue, but a recent increase of violent crimes in Brazil may add to these safety concerns. Gullifor, however, said there should be little worry about intern safety.

"NBC provides very tight security, and one could argue it will be as safe there as anywhere," Gullifor said. "Some folks forget that the last incident at the Olympics happened on American soil (Atlanta), so I'm not overly concerned about it and neither are the students I talk to."

Not all accepted interns will make the journey to Rio. Bradley interns will be split between Rio and Stamford, Connecticut, where they will assist event coverage remotely.

Last year, 18 interns worked with the 2014 Winter Olympics held in Sochi, Russia. Twelve students worked from Stamford while eight voyaged across the globe to join NBC's Sochi team.

Senior public relations major Anna Wilks worked as a Guide Intern in Sochi.

"My experience was incredible," Wilks said. "I never thought in a million years that I would be going to the Olympics, and I made so many great friends through the experience as well as professional connections. I learned a lot about my work ethic and how much I can handle all in a day's work."

As advice for intern hopefuls, Wilks shared a few thoughts.

"Take advantage of all the resources Bradley has, such as the career center and workshops they host; I went to all of them, and they really helped," she said. "Also, be yourself. For my final interview, the Skype interview, I was completely myself and basically told them that I believe I am very qualified for this job [and] am so ready to do this. [Have] confidence."

Those wishing to intern at the 2016 Olympics may apply for one of three positions, which are runner, logger and shot selector.

Applicants must have a current class standing of sophomore or above with a minimum GPA of 3.0. Preferred qualifications are junior or senior class standing and knowledge of or interest in Olympic sports.

Internship durations will be three to six weeks, between July 18 and Aug. 24, 2016.



Note: The following endorsements were based off a consensus of the 2015-2016 Scout editorial board. Staff members who have social relationships with candidates were excluded from the endorsement process.

The student body elections in 2013-2014 were sadly lacking in candidates. This year, however, is a welcome change from last, with every candidate running against at least one opponent.

With falling admission rates, rising tuition and many administrative changes, Student Body Officers will have to be able to adjust to change and advocate for students throughout their terms.

Based on individual interviews, comments at Wednesday's debate and the votes of The Scout staff, we have chosen to endorse the following candidates.

President of the Student Body

Jason Blumenthal is the incumbent candidate and has served the student body well this year, supporting numerous resolutions. We are confident he can continue developing Student Senate in a second term as president.

Blumenthal has guided Student Senate, all while building strong relationships with administrators and community members. With the uncertainties likely to surround campus next year, we believe the President of the Student Body needs to be someone that students, administrators, faculty and community members are familiar with already.

Still, Blumenthal needs to work on communicating the administration's viewpoints to students in a way that can relate to them. Although he advocates for students on committees and with administrators, he speaks more from an administrator's perspective when talking to students.

Sarah Handler has been an effective Speaker of the Assembly and has worked to recruit student senators. Her idea to encourage students to take pride in current programs at Bradley would work. Additionally, Handler has worked toward sustainability efforts on campus since her freshman year and has very specific ideas to bring to Student Senate next year.

However, while we believe her main goal, sustainability, is important to society, it is not a primary concern of the students at this time. Handler's goals for the presidency are somewhat misaligned with students' goals, and it seems it is more about her own experience as president and not student experiences.

Overall, Student Senate needs a president that knows the job and can sideline their personal agendas for student needs. Blumenthal has shown he can do that this year and has said he will continue to do so.

Speaker of the Assembly:

Both Charlie Cohen and Olga Krapivner possess good qualities as potential Speaker. Cohen has multiple contacts throughout the university and extensive experience with parliamentary procedure. Krapivner has experience on Student Senate and has learned about student concerns through that.

Although we feel each of these three candidates can serve the students well, we chose to endorse Sojourner White for Speaker of the Assembly. White has a wide campus experience as a Student Admissions Representative, peer mentor and resident advisor that will be useful as Speaker. Through her involvement with these programs and more, she has shown she is dedicated to students on campus. We think White has a perspective the other candidates lack, and has been missing from the

Student Senate executive board for some time.

White has plans to fill Senate seats, specifically by reaching out to students living in residence halls. She also wants to emphasize global leadership on campus as well as improve the Student Speak Up open forum so students attendees wanting to speak have the opportunity to do so.

Secretary of the Finances:

Current Secretary of the Finances **Hunter Vaughn** will serve well returning with his many experiences in finance on campus through his treasurer positions on the Interfraternity Council (IFC), Global Business Association, Lambda Chi Alpha, Powder Ski and Snowboard Club and Student Activities Budget Review Committee.

With his knowledge of ethics and control systems, the senior accounting major will hold his fellow senators and students accountable as he did when he was treasurer for his fraternity. Vaughn said he plans to become even more involved with the cabinet members' budgets so very little money is wasted.

Sophomore Brian Ivancich is a well-versed candidate and

has important student concerns in mind, but the Secretary of Finances this year should ideally have experience with Student Senate finances.

Vaughn's understanding of how to improve upon existing financial procedures for Student Senate far exceeds Ivancich's.

Secretary of the Assembly:

Although experience is needed for some positions, there is also room for fresh eyes in other positions. We believe freshman Allie Hoffman will provide that as Secretary of the Assembly.

Hoffman's opponent, sophomore Ashley Borja, would also fit as Secretary of the Assembly; however, when presented with unexpected questions and concerns, Borja's responses show a limited understanding of major student concerns.

The secretary's job is primarily to record the minutes and communicate with the student senators. And while we believe Hoffman and Borja are capable, we urge these candidates to do more to stay in tune with student concerns outside Student Senate meetings, an area in which they are both lacking.

Slightly freaking out since I thought I was the only person in the building, I decided to sit back down and work on homework again until I could muster up the bravery to walk out of Sisson.


About ten minutes later, I heard the toilet flush.

SID Parker balls out in college

What is the price of living a double life?

For Bobby Parker, Bradley University's Associate AD for Communications, that price is going to pay pretty well, all things considered.

Recently, Parker came clean to the media and revealed his bestkept secret; he is the star quarterback at New Mexico State University (NMSU) and is NFLbound this coming May.

"It's more of a hobby really," Parker said. "I don't see what the big deal is; all I have to do is run away from people and occasionally throw the ball."

While at NMSU, Parker, who is a five-foot-six-inch senior, became the only player in college football history to ever win the Heisman Trophy three times as the most outstanding college football player in 2012, 2013 and 2015.

Parker also became the first player to ever win the Maxwell award three times ('12, '13 and '15), which is awarded to the best player in the United States.

"I didn't even know I played that well," Parker said. "When the awards started coming in, I just kinda sat them aside and used them to hold down all the job applications we received in the athletic department this year. I just wish I could've won the Heisman all four years; we had to replace a lot of people."

Even with all his hardware, Parker's career at NMSU is one heralded among the best seen by mortal eyes.

After finishing his college career



last January, Parker will leave NMSU with the school record for passing touchdowns (125), passing yards (13,533) and rushing touchdowns (59).

That's not even the half of it, as Parker played both offense and defense for the Aggies. He would claim a school record 19 interceptions and 10 defensive touchdowns in his two seasons on the defensive side of the ball.

Those accomplishments aside, there is one achievement that Parker will hold near and dear to his Aggie heart.

'Nothing beats that record 56-yard field goal," Parker said. "I had never worked at anything harder than my field goal kicking. People always said my 99-yard touchdown run to beat Nevada was the best, or winning the Orange Bowl my senior year, but those people are stupid. The field goal is where it's at."

With his college career in the rear view and the NFL Draft approaching, Parker would love to hear his name called, but said he isn't focused on where he will be selected in the NFL draft.

"Don't get me wrong, that would be cool," Parker said. "I just haven't paid attention much to the draft rankings. I've been too busy trying to get coach [Brian] Wardle settled in here."



Pitching leads baseball to series win

Bradley pitchers bulldozed Southern Illinois hitters this weekend in the baseball team's home opening series. The Braves took two out of three games in the series thanks to the performances on the mound.

"They located all their pitches," head coach Elvis Dominguez said. "They had everything going."

The performance of the weekend came in the series opener when junior Elliot Ashbeck took the mound. The right-hander threw his first career complete game shutout against the Salukis as he scattered five hits in the game while striking out nine and walking none.

"This week, he set the tone for us," Dominguez said. "He pitched down in the zone [and] had his changeup and breaking ball and slider working."

Ashbeck's dominance earned him the honor of Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) pitcher of the week.

SIU's Aaron Hauge also tossed a gem. Fortunately for the Braves, Hauge made enough mistakes for the men to score.

Hauge left a fastball over the heart of the plate to leadoff hitter Chris Godinez in the 3rd inning. Godinez drove the pitch for a triple to the left-center gap, and was the hit home on a sacrifice fly by junior Isaac Smith.

That was the only run of the game, as the Braves prevailed 1-0.

The next day proved to be similar until the 7th inning, when the Braves exploded for nine runs in one inning to win 10-0 due to the MVC run rule. Sophomore Evan Gruener led off the inning with a solo home run and ended the inning with a two RBI single.

The other highlight of the day was, once again, the performance of a Bradley starting pitcher. Junior Steve Adkins went the distance in the game as he struck out seven and only allowed five hits.

"Steve was impressive on Saturday," Dominguez said. "He pitched out of trouble in two innings, but overall he just threw a ton of strikes, so that's really the key."

The Braves went for the sweep

on Sunday, but the Salukis didn't go down without a fight. Junior Brent Stong started the game for the Braves, and although he was not at his best, he allowed just one run before exiting the game in the seventh.

However, when the bullpen came in, the Braves couldn't hold the lead. A costly error by Godinez in the top of the 8th caused what could have been a double play to turn into a three run inning for the Salukis.

Despite Brave rallies in the bottom of the 8th and 9th, the men were not able to score another run up and lost 5-3.

Aside from the nine run inning the Braves had, they had a hard time putting runs up over the weekend. Dominguez credits the Saluki pitching.

"Their starting pitching was very dominant," Dominguez said. "They kept us off balance the whole weekend. [Against Hauge], we just could not get comfortable in the box. He was just as

good as Elliot was. Same thing on Saturday, that guy was equally as good. We just couldn't get anything going offensively."

Senior Isaac Smith, who leads the Braves with a .400 batting average, believes that a lot of Brave hitters had poor at bats on the weekend, which led to struggles at the plate.

"Saturday, we just didn't do a good job, to be honest, of getting the ball in play and making them make plays," Smith said. "On Sunday, it was just a matter of hitters not having productive at bats."

The Braves said they are extremely confident that their hitting will continue to improve throughout the rest of the season and that they will continue their winning ways.

"The guys have great camaraderie right now," Smith said. "I truly don't feel like there is a ceiling for us right now, we can go as far as we want to go."

Ward, Delvo win individual titles

Just one month removed from finishing the indoor season, both the men's and women's track and field outdoor seasons took off last weekend with the Vanderbilt Black and Gold Invitational in Nashville.

Friday started on a high note for the Braves. Junior Emily Delvo and freshman Michael Ward claimed their respective 1,500 meter titles, and junior Marshall Moyer won the men's 5,000 meter.

Delvo crossed the line with a time of 4:27.70, squeaking past the second-place finisher 35 one-hundredths of a second for the victory.

She did this despite the weather, with temperatures ranging from 50 degrees to just above freezing.

Delvo said she was happy she was able to overcome the weather while still posting a good time.

"The weather wasn't the greatest and I was still one second off last year so it was pretty exciting," Delvo said. "Overall I think our

team did very well as a whole. Definitely a good start to our outdoor season."

Fellow junior Caitlin Busch was 11th in the field, missing her careerbest time by less than one second, with her twin sister Kristen close behind her in 12th place. Sophomore Steffen Uhrich

finished third in the men's 2,000

meter steeplechase and senior Kyela Specht took fifth in the women's 800 meter to highlight the final day of competition. The teams will be in action this weekend at two different meets

weekend at two different meets. Some of the top teams in the country will be in Stanford, California, for the Stanford Invitational today.

Delvo and Ward will be among the Bradley runners who will be heading to California. Ward will be one of four Braves to participate in the 5,000 meter event.

On the women's side, Kristen Busch will join Caitlin in the 10,000 meter race. Kristen set the Bradley record in the event last year at Stanford. She won the Missouri Valley

Conference title in the event last year en route to an 18th place finish at the NCAA Championship.

Meanwhile, Bradley will also send runners to the Eastern Illinois University Big Blue Classic.

Eighteen women will enter in the 1,500 meter race tomorrow, led by sophomore Casey Kramer. Kramer posted the best time in that race out of any player scheduled to run, and her 4:35.95 in the indoor event is just outside the top 10 times in Bradley history.

Eight men will race in the men's 1,500, including freshman Haran Dunderdale. The race will be Dunderdale's first race of that distance. Bradley is also expected to compete in the 4x400 meter relay.

The events are expected to begin around 2 p.m.



Masrin leads men's golf by example in final year

At the end of the spring semester, men's golf senior Danny Masrin will not only see his final Bradley golf season end, but his time at Bradley will draw to a close as well

From his freshman to senior year, Masrin has aided the Bradley Braves men's golf team by being one of the most accomplished golfers of recent time.

Masrin's golf accomplishments teed off while he attended Jakarta International School. During his four years, he lettered and was given the individual title for the Interscholastic Association of South East Asian Schools.

At Bradley, he has continued to maintain such golf and scholastic achievements.

"Being a part of this team has been an awesome experience that I will never forget," Masrin said. "Since I have been at Bradley, I have seen the highs and lows of the men's golf team, and we have continued to work hard and improve every year."

Academically, Masrin has been on Bradley Athletic Director's Honor Roll nearly every semester. In 2014, he was also awarded Missouri Valley Conference (MVC) Honor Roll, in addition to being named the Bradley Country Financial Scholar-Athlete of the Week twice within the same year.

Athletically, Masrin earned spots on the All-Missouri Valley Conference and First-Team MVC Scholar-Athlete in the 2013-2014 season, and named the MVC Golfer of the Week at least once in each of those two years.

Throughout his four years, Masrin played a total of 102 rounds, with an overall average of 76.12 from 7,764 strokes, up until this point in the season. He placed in the top 10 on five occasions and 13 times in the top 20.

In his career, he has shot in the

70s more than 80 percent of his rounds. His average score in his time at Bradley is 76, with his best season being in 2013-14 with one title and three top finishes.

Masrin's junior year was a record-breaking and title-winning time for the Palatine native.

"[For me], to be able to come back and win from 11 shots in the final round at the Butler Invitational in this past fall season was a great addition to [my] résumé," Masrin said.

If he continues to perform well at his current pace, he will have one of his best seasons yet.

This year, Masrin has placed in the top 20 on five different occasions, while averaging a round that is slightly below 75.

He tied for fifth place at the MVC Championship, the highest finish for a Bradley golfer since the 2005 league championships.

In addition, he shot an all time career-low 68 that got him the sixth lowest round in Bradley's history at the Butler Fall Invite, where Masrin won his first and only title and Bradley golf's first title since 1996.

Masrin will graduate in December 2015, and as Masrin leaves the team, he leaves behind a squad that will be without their senior leader, however. He said the team has potential.

"I would first tell them that they are all great golfers," Masrin said. "They need to work together to push each other and strive to be the best they can be."

He also said they cannot count on their talents alone.

"I would also say that they need to have confidence in what they do," Masrin said. "[They need to] believe in themselves and that they have the ability to win tournaments."

Masrin said he intends to return to Indonesia where he work towards qualifying for the Asian Tour following his graduation.

Softball sweeps Loyola, rallies past Western Illinois

Senior Shannon King entered last weekend's series against the Loyola Ramblers with a .156 average coming off a tough game against the Missouri State Bears. Bradley's last four games treated her and the rest of the softball team much better.

In her 14 at-bats over Bradley's last four games, King picked up seven hits, six RBIs and three runs while leading Bradley's offense to four straight victories.

Last Saturday, the Braves swept a doubleheader against the Ramblers thanks to a little patience and a lot of pitching.

Down 3-1 entering the sixth inning, the Braves drew six walks against Loyola's Madison Hope, leading to a four-run outburst that gave the Braves the lead. Bradley would hold on to win the game

Head coach Amy Hayes said the team is very patient at the plate, noting her batters are exceptional at reading the pitcher.

"I think we have a pretty good command of the strike zone, and we work very hard to be able to hit balls that are off the plate anyway," Hayes said. "A good hitter can tell when a pitcher is kind of struggling and falling behind and we need to be a little bit more patient, or when [a pitcher is] just trying to stretch the zone."

In the second game Saturday,

the Braves received a dominating pitching performance from sophomore Jaelen Hull. Hull tossed a complete game shutout, scattering seven hits and one walk while striking out four.

It was an encouraging performance for Hull, who tossed 116 pitches in the effort, especially since she was removed from a game two weeks ago due to what coach Hayes called a "soft" pitch count. Hayes said the team is still going to track Hull's workload.

"I think we still have to keep an eye on her," Hayes said. "[Her pitch count] was probably a little high, but she felt really good, and she wanted to keep going."

Bradley got another dominating performance in the circle Sunday from senior Alyson Spinas-Valainis. She, too, tossed a complete game shutout, allowing just five hits in her seven innings

King helped Spinas-Valainis' cause by cranking out three hits in four at-bats, tallying four RBIs and scoring a run. She also made a leaping grab to end the game, similar to how Bradley's loss to Missouri State ended a week prior.

The Braves took on Western Illinois in a non-conference game Tuesday, rallying from an early five run deficit to beat the Leathernecks 10-8. Three unearned runs scored for the Braves in the bottom of the sixth inning thanks to a pair of errors on Leatherneck left fielder Holly Hoelting. Hayes

said the team has the mentality needed to rally and win games.

"It's just a testament to what we kind of keep preaching to them: just keep your head down, and it'll come," Hayes said. "They have not quit on us, they have not stopped

working hard, [and] they have not stopped swinging the bat. They've really kind of started to trust the process. I think we're gaining a little bit of confidence. Any time you can come from a five-run deficit and come back to win, you just

want to keep it rolling."

Bradley takes on Indiana State in a doubleheader Saturday at noon. The team will face the Sycamores again Sunday at noon to close the series.

Wardle introduced as next men's basketball coach

On March 28, Brian Wardle was introduced as the 14th head coach of Bradley men's basketball, one day after he was hired to the position.

The hiring of Wardle begins a new era of Bradley basketball, which officially closes the door on the Geno Ford era.

After being introduced in a public ceremony, Wardle answered questions in a press conference for the media, where he made it clear that change is coming for the program.

"It's not going to be easy.It's going to be work, it's going to be accountability, it's going to be discipline, it's going to be direct communication, but all of those things I feel very confident I can provide and direct this program in the right direction."

Wardle said that there were three points that attracted him to be the head coach at Bradley: the opportunity Bradley provides, the Missouri Valley Conference and Director of Athletics Chris Reynolds.

"I want to be around that, and I want to be around an athletic director who is going to support that and be there and be able to bounce ideas off of," Wardle said. [I want someone to] be able to go in and just talk to. Sometimes as a head coach, you don't want to bring stuff to your staff, and you certainly don't want to bring it home sometimes to your wife and kids."

He also said that he's going to bring a defensive style of basketball to Bradley, which will help form an identity for Bradley basketball.

"Your defense has to outlast your offense," Wardle said. "There's identities in the Valley. Coaches have been there a long time now, and they have a brand of basketball when you think of schools, and that's what we

need. We need to build that."

With the hiring of Wardle, the positions of assistant basketball coach and director of basketball operations have become open with the departures of Jaden Uken and Ronald Coleman.

Wardle said he's going to begin the search to fill out his staff for the coming year.

"I've got a short list, and I'm anxious to sit down and talk with people and share ideas but also see why Bradley and see what they know about Bradley and where we can go from that," Wardle said.

Wardle met with the players on Bradley's team throughout the week and told them what they could expect from him as the new coach.

"You're going to have a head coach that's very passionate and open-minded and will lead by example," Wardle said. "The relationship building is going to take time, but if you buy in, have an open mind, and give it a chance, you're going to see yourself get better."

Apparently, the pitch did not work on some players, as Wednesday afternoon Bradley announced six players, including freshman Josh Cunningham and junior Tramique Sutherland, would transfer out of Bradley.

"No coach and no player is bigger than Bradley basketball," Wardle said in a press release. "My goal this year is to establish culture in the locker room that is team first, self last...Obviously, we have some work to do in recruiting, but I knew that was going to be the case, and I look forward to getting out to spread the message and share my vision of the future of Bradley Basketball."
